### IV. Statement of Public Notice

The Board may or may not respond to public comments. Any Board responses to public comments will generally be addressed during Board Forum, or during committee reports. However, all comments are considered and will be investigated and addressed as appropriate.

Please be courteous and mindful of the rights of others when speaking. Comments may not be abusive, obscene, threatening or irrelevant. Please understand that students and employees have specific legal and privacy protections. The Board is not permitted to respond in public to comments about students and employees. Please also understand that the Board will not be responsible for the content of comments made by members of the public. Members of the public are cautioned that they are speaking at their own risk and any personally directed statements they make may subject them to legal liability to the effected individual.

If it is necessary for the Board to go into executive session at the end of the meeting, we will provide an estimated length of time for the session and whether any action is anticipated to be taken upon returning to public session.

## V. Town Hall Meeting: Technology in Education

Mr. Markarian, Ms. Fox, Mr. Miziak, Mr. Blinder, Ms. Corcoran and Ms. DuPuis presented several slides to highlight how technology is being used in education.

Several examples of hardware and software illustrated included Google Forms, Chromebooks, QR codes, Nearpod, Google Classroom and Hapara. Mr. Blinder explained the settings being used in the classroom management software being piloted, Hapara, and Ms. Dupuis illustrated how Hapara is utilized by teachers while audience members were the classroom students.

Following the presentation working groups of parents, teachers, Board of Education members and administrators discussed each group's thoughts about technology in education.

classroom?	<ul> <li>Transition periods; teachers may struggle with the new way of teaching</li> <li>Convincing parents that technology is a positive</li> <li>Concerned about too much technology/screen time; parents being able to support their kids at home</li> <li>technology/screen overload – learning now to balance</li> <li>Insufficient amount of chromebooks or cell phones, especially at the elementary level</li> <li>Difficult to transfer math instruction (symbols, efficiency, etc) to technology</li> <li>Inability to see students' mathematical thinking without a stylus and is bulky otherwise</li> <li>Distractions</li> <li>Younger children have a more difficult time using technology, as many can't type</li> <li>Less face to face time</li> <li>Teacher's inability to closely monitor student tabs. Individual student use of technology affect them as well</li> </ul>
What are the benefits of meaningful technology use in the classroom? Drawbacks?	<ul> <li>Teachers keeping students engaged</li> <li>Redefining how kids are learning</li> <li>Learning how to use it as an asset is important</li> <li>Access to more information, connections, more student engagement</li> <li>When used appropriately, supports deeper instruction/learning</li> <li>Helps with remediating basic skills</li> <li>A lot of kids are cheating</li> <li>Ensuring students are on task and are focused</li> <li>Keeps students engaged and on task. Enables us to remain connected regardless of location.  Enable teacher to interact with student work outside of the classroom</li> </ul>
How do students feel	- Overall, at home; kids feel happy about having

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about technology use in the classroom? Outside of the classroom?	<ul> <li>individual chrome books</li> <li>In the school classroom, some of the students said it was too much time on the screen during a self-paced lesson</li> <li>It is a very personal opinion; some children thrive with technology; some may not</li> <li>They are very much at ease in the classroom, outside of class - even more!</li> <li>Students love to use devices, but also can make them nervous as they feel like someone is monitoring them</li> </ul>
How distracted are students? At school and at home?	<ul> <li>Some students were very focused; they would go through their work and want more</li> <li>New users of technology would be easily distracted</li> <li>Students tend to listen to teachers better than their own parents</li> <li>In school, very distracted! When devices are available, they cannot stay on one task. Their attention span is very short.</li> </ul>
How can teachers / admin / parents promote academic integrity?	<ul> <li>A better information tracking system for incidents</li> <li>parents/teachers have to model how to do things correctly; kids model behavior more than what is said/taught to them</li> <li>Defining what "academic integrity" means to a young child</li> <li>Having ground rules/contracts at home</li> <li>"Parent that child you have"</li> <li>They can model proper citations as well as appropriate behavior on social media</li> <li>Make students familiar with AUP and have ongoing conversations</li> </ul>
What do parents need to support students with technology?	<ul> <li>Access to some of the tools that the district is using - how to supervise what they are doing</li> <li>Parent awareness on how to navigate and achieve</li> <li>They need to set boundaries on usage of</li> </ul>

technology - Lessons and tutorials like the BTEA sessions in September 2020 - More open sessions to the public
